# A Message From The Minister

Discipleship is at the heart of the Christian faith. The disciples were at the core of Jesus' ministry and their calling is well documented in the Gospels. Those who are called to be disciples are also called to 'make' disciples, that is, share the Good News that they have received. Maybe it is just as well that the word 'disciple' more or less means 'learner'. So, we are called to be learners of Jesus' way and help other to learn too.

Exeter Methodist Circuit has asked if I would run some 'disciple' courses for the Methodist churches in the Circuit, and that means for you and your church! Starting in April, the Circuit has chosen 'Freedom in Christ', run twice, the same course, but on different nights of the week.

**At Wonford Methodist** – Tuesdays 7.30-9.30pm 12th April – 2nd November

**At Crediton Methodist** – Wednesdays 7.30-9.30pm 21st April - 10th November

In effect the same course will run in two locations, a total of 13 sessions over a period of 6 months, with a break in the summer. The idea is that the two geographical locations mean that there should be one relatively close to you. It also means that, if you can't make one night on a particular week, you can 'catch up' by attending the other.

The 'Freedom in Christ' course uses a tried and tested format that allows an exploration of your personal and individual walk with God. Each week there are DVD clips, group work and individual reflection, all biblically based and in the context of fellowship and worship. In short, it gives you an opportunity 'to grow as a Christian'; and it is suggested that every Christian would benefit from it. ## Proud to be an Evangelical

Joan and I are both members of **MET**. Now that's nothing to do with the London police or weather forecasting; MET stands for **M**ethodist **E**vangelicals **T**ogether. We've belonged to it since the 1960s in its previous incarnations as The Methodist Revival Fellowship, Conservative Evangelicals in Methodism and Headway. At the end of January we went to the South West Regional Conference of MET held at the Livermead Hotel, Torquay, where we had a marvellous room overlooking the bay. Joan is on the South West Committee so has quite a hand in the organisation of the conference. There were over 100 of us at the weekend and we were led by Revd Steve Wild, the Chair of the Cornwall Methodist District, on the subject of "Renewal in the Local Church". It was an excellent weekend with Steve entertaining us with his inimitable brand of northern humour and also

inspiring us to think of the state and future of our local churches as God seeks to revive His work in our communities. He had many encouraging stories of churches in the South West which have completely turned their fortunes around and are now renewed and growing, often by virtue of venturing out into new spheres and methods of being contemporary church. Steve's most amusing story was of his going in his shorts and tee-shirt to an important Civic Service in a Cornish town, arriving rather late, and finding that the only contents of the bag that he had hurriedly grabbed as he left home and which he thought contained his ministerial togs, contained only a whale costume. He was hurriedly clothed in an ill-fitting suit of one of the steward's recently deceased husband!!

One of the highlights of the weekend for us and a few musicians who came over from Wonford (Gary, Karen and Pippa joined us this year) is to lead the Saturday evening Prayer and Praise meeting. To stand at the front of that and hear the wall of sound coming from the enthusiastic voices of a Methodist crowd is really something. There are banner wavers too – it's quite a boisterous but lovely time of worship and prayer. Incidentally, we took up the offering at that meeting and the total given was over £1000; this was evenly divided between Shelterbox and Torquay Street Pastors.

MET is an organisation of growing strength and influence within British Methodism and is supported by such as Pete Pillinger, our new District Chair, who visited the Torquay conference, our previous Plymouth and Exeter and Cornwall Chairs, John Carne and Chris Blake, now Principle of Cliff College, and Tom Stuckey, who have been our speakers at the past few year's conferences. So we are in good company. MET's stated objectives, founded on our belief in the authority of scripture, are to

- ★ Emphasise the heart of the gospel at the heart of our church
- ★ Underpin everything with God-centred worship and prayer
- ★ Encourage fresh ways of being church
- ★ Develop confidence in evangelism
- ★ Support action for justice
- ★ Proclaim and affirm our conviction of God's love in Christ for all the world

The word "evangelical" has obtained a somewhat tarnished image in some quarters, but we are proud to call ourselves by it and pleased and blessed to belong to MET. We invite you to join us and the near 3000 others who belong. We can give you leaflets containing joining forms and show you samples of the resources, especially the excellent, high quality quarterly

magazine. And ... by the way, we have the CD's of the four talks by Steve Wild, which we would be pleased to lend you for personal or group use. And finally, can we tempt you to come to next January's conference at Torquay when the speaker, to drop another name, will be Revd Dr Martyn Atkins, General Secretary of the Methodist Church.

## **Holy Living, Holy Dying**

This was a one day conference which I was privileged to attend in November 09 and I am grateful to the Church Council for funding my place. The day involved a variety of speakers who brought the subject of a good death to the fore. Each speaker gave a very interesting point of view and insight to aspects of dying, bereavement and care of those at the end of life. Each talk gave information varying in depth from the well researched to those of personal experience and there were question and answer sessions at the end of each of the talks. A marvellous luncheon was provided and I was blessed to meet new people from all walks of life and those I already knew from my own hospital setting.

A conclusion may be that there is no quick answer in times like these and that time is needed to allow each person involved in the situation to come forward with their needs, hopes and even their fears. To allow them to say what is needed, not to put forward a plan of what you think they need, although sometimes it is helpful to prompt ideas. The news can be quite stunning and so the newly diagnosed should be allowed time to find their feelings about the new situation, however, the earlier plans are made the more helpful when a person dies, so leaving instructions to help relatives and friends after the death and this can give some power/focus to the dying as they may feel powerless to help their situation.

If you want to talk on the subject further, for whatever reason, please see me or call at any time. As you can probably tell, there was so much more than I have space to tell of here.

## **To India with The Leprosy Mission**

Before November I had never been to India. For the past year I had been talking about the work of The Leprosy Mission and in particular its impact throughout India, but I hadn't seen any of it first hand. The extent of my experience with this great country was getting an Indian takeaway. But this all changed as I flew into Kolkata on November 8th 2009, and I have not been the same since.



My trip took me throughout the most highly populated city in the world (26,000 people per km<sup>2</sup>) as well as to some of the most rural areas of West Bengal to see how TLM is working with the poorest, most vulnerable and alienated people affected by leprosy. I visited hospitals, care homes, schools, vocational training centres and community projects. I was welcomed into people's homes, hospital rooms, leprosy colonies, remote villages and slums. I saw people being diagnosed with the disease, being treated with Multi Drug Therapy, undergoing surgery for leprosy related deformities and people rebuilding their lives after leprosy has taken so much from them. I saw so many different people – babies and children, men and women, young and old, middle class, the poor and the even poorer. I saw so much need. So much yet to be done. So much devastation caused by leprosy and by poverty. My heart cried out. Where are you God? Why have you abandoned these people?

During a visit to the mercy home attached to Purulia hospital, which caters for those who have had leprosy for many years, with most of the residents having been there for at least 25 years, a group of ladies sang for us. These elderly women gathered in a circle giggling like little girls. They propped each other up, supporting those who couldn't walk and guiding those who couldn't see. Then they burst into song. It was the most beautiful sound I had heard. Sukri was abandoned her by her parents 46 years ago. Aba came here when her husband left her for someone without leprosy at least 25 years ago. Each of the women shared a similar story of rejection and loss and yet all they wanted to do was to sing to us, to share their joy and



their love with some English visitors. That's when it struck me – the thing that all the people I saw had in common. Hope. Possibility. A future.

Leprosy can destroy much of the body but the stigma of leprosy destroys so much more. It destroys life. It destroys people's worth, their potential, their soul. The Leprosy Mission through practical support and healing is doing so much for these people, but it is in fact the endless love and compassion

that the wonderful and selfless TLM staff show that is healing the deeper wounds brought about by this terrible disease. It is slowly giving worth, bringing much needed attention and comfort and it is, most importantly, speaking truth into their lives – the truth that they are precious children of God and that their lives have significance; they have a role to play. There is hope.

I returned home with an enormous sense of pride that I am part of an organisation which is doing so much fantastic work, and which is bringing the gift of hope to so many forgotten people. Thank you for being a part of this significant work with me.

## **News from the Methodist Church**

### **Haiti Appeal Passes £400,000 Mark**

Donations to both MRDF and the Methodist Church's World Mission Fund are supporting the emergency relief and long-term rehabilitation work being carried out by the Methodist Church in Haiti. MRDF is also channelling funds to Action by Churches Together. As well as funding food, blankets, tents and latrines, donations to MRDF have helped to provide a water purification system in the Belair neighbourhood of Port-au-Prince. This is providing 10,000 homeless Haitians with the first clean drinking water they have had since the earthquake struck.

Expressing his gratitude for the initial grant, the Revd Gesner Paul District President of the Methodist Church in Haiti said, "We thank you for standing near us at this time of severe difficulty and continue to count on your support by any means as we try to recover from this very traumatic disaster."

In his Sunday sermon the Revd George Mulrain, president of the Methodist Church in the Caribbean and the Americas, said, "Our contribution to Haiti does not wait until a disaster strikes. It is ongoing. Various agencies and organisations are contributing to relief in Haiti, which is commendable. But soon the dust will settle and the media folk will turn to another 'breaking news story' as the saga of Haiti recedes into the background. Not so with us as Methodists. We are there to stay, because our motive is not to make the news headlines. The love of Christ constrains us and we stay."

The Revd Tom Quenet, Methodist partnership coordinator for the Americas and the Caribbean, is planning to visit Haiti later this month. "The figures that the Methodist Church in Haiti have sent us represent a massive loss of the Church's infrastructure to serve the men, women and children of Haiti," he said. "The destruction of schools means that the effects of the earthquake will be felt by many generations into the future, the loss of clinics means that lives will be shortened for lack of health care, the destruction of child care facilities will mean that children and young people will become vulnerable to exploitation and abuse. The overwhelmingly generous response of the Methodist people means that not only are people receiving water, food and shelter in the immediate aftermath of the earthquake, but also the Haitian Church will be best ready to respond in alleviating the long term consequences."

## **Methodist Church Establishes Independent Education Commission**

The Methodist Church is establishing an independent education commission responsible for reviewing Methodism's approach to education in Britain. It will report to the Methodist Conference in 2012.

The commission will be responsible for identifying a set of principles and a theological rationale, which underpins Methodism's engagement with education. It will cover all forms of formal education, including the Church's responsibility for 64 state-maintained Methodist day schools and 14

independent schools across England and Wales, as well as its involvement in further education and higher education. It will also consider the Methodist approach to, and involvement with, informal education, including links to the Church's work with children and youth, and all forms of chaplaincy in education.

## **National BBC Radio Appeal Will Benefit Countryside People**

On 7 March BBC Radio 4 will broadcast an appeal to help the Arthur Rank Centre (ARC), a Christian countryside charity and resource unit supported by national Churches (including the Methodist Church), the Royal Agricultural Society of England and the Rank Foundation.

For all its beauty, life in the countryside can be tough. Over 900,000 rural households live in poverty, and problems such as depression, stress, relationship difficulties, health, finance and business difficulties can go undiagnosed and unheard.

The Revd Gordon Gatward, director of the ARC, said, "The ARC was chosen for an appeal because we have been supporting rural communities and their churches for over 38 years. Initiatives that have come out of the ARC have given thousands of people hope over the years: Rural Stress Helpline, agricultural chaplains and rural officers, Arthur Rank Training and community development projects like Hidden Britain, Care Farming, Farm Crisis Network and the ARC-Addington Fund."
