

A Message From The Minister

Dear Friends,

On Ash Wednesday, the circuit ministers had an away day at St. Rita's Retreat & Conference Centre, Honiton. During the closing worship, we were told that St. Rita is the saint of hopeless causes and that her symbol is a rose. Apparently on her death bed she asked for a rose from the garden of the home she used to live in. Despite being winter, a single rose was found flowering there, which was brought to her, and was seen to symbolise that through simple faith, the 'impossible' might be granted. And each of us was given a rose as we left.

I decided to try and dry the rose out, so that I could place it somewhere visible throughout Lent as a reminder of all that we thought about that day. About a week later I looked at it before I went to a staff meeting. After hanging it upside down, it had shrivelled and was crisp and had no scent. When I arrived at the meeting, I noticed my colleague's rose in a vase, full of colour and far more attractive to look at.

I've found this comparison between the two roses quite startling. What was it within me that sought to cling to this rose and make it last through Lent, and in the process so quickly lose the beauty of it? Why did I not allow myself to simply enjoy the rose's colour and scent whilst it lasted?

As I ponder this, I am reminded of Ecclesiastes 3:1 – "For everything there is a season". This was the wisdom that the author of Ecclesiastes came to appreciate. All things, however hard or painful, however fruitful or enjoyable, have their time. They will come to an end. Sometimes, when this might be something difficult, we long for an end to come, for a new season. During these times, such wisdom may well be a source of encouragement – things will pass, we will not be overwhelmed, there will be a new season. But such wisdom may be more of a challenge when things have been going well. How good are we, individually and collectively, at recognising that there is a season for everything? That there comes a time when even that which has worked well or been a source of enjoyment must come to an end. Are we able to recognise this as part of the natural rhythm of life, to accept the end of something not with a sense of failure but of gratitude for that season within God's purposes? Or do we try to cling to these things and miss the beauty of what God is doing in this moment, like me with the rose?

As we journey through Lent toward Good Friday and Easter we are encouraged to embrace again the different times of Jesus' life and ministry, especially throughout Holy Week. From the celebration of Palm Sunday, to the intimacy of Bethany, the humility of the upper room, the anguish of the

garden and of betrayal and denial, the pain and the loneliness of Good Friday, the confusion and emptiness of Saturday, and finally to the joy and transformation of Easter. In this we are reminded that seasons follow a pattern of death leading into new life. The ending of one season prepares for the next, but both are necessary. There can be no Easter without Good Friday.

If we struggle in this way, we are in good company! I am reminded of Jesus' words to Mary when he appears to her at the tomb on Easter morning. As she recognises who Jesus is, Jesus says to her "Do not cling to me" (John 20:17). As much as Mary might long for a return to all that she knew and enjoyed about Jesus' earthly ministry, there is a new season ahead, one that Mary (or we) cannot enjoy if we attempt to cling to the past. Jesus must return to his Father so that a new season can come, where His Spirit is poured out among them. His words to Mary are an invitation to her (and us) not to return to an old life, a past season, but to enter new life.

Circuit News

Axminster Church

On the 19th January, at the Circuit Meeting, Deacon Becky Lovatt gave an inspiring account of the work being undertaken by the Axminster Church. We are very grateful to Becky for allowing us to print some extracts from her talk.

The church at Axminster has been on a long journey. The building at Lyme



Road is in need of a lot of repair, and due to a lack of disposable income and an ageing congregation it was really a non-starter. Over the summer we prayed hard and investigated several options for the furtherance of our fellowship. One of those options was an exciting opportunity for Axminster Methodist Church to become a worshiping community at the heart of a new community project.

Pippins community and Business centre has been born out of the vision of the Town council and Axminster Churches to take over a newly refurbished house on Lyme Road and create in it a hub for the community. The church has obtained a permanent room in the building which has been christened the 'Upper Room'.

The Circuit gave us a loan against the sale of the Church building of £2,500 to cover the cost of 15 new, comfortable chairs and the first 6 months rent, for which we are very grateful. Axminster carpets have gifted us with a new carpet and underlay and many people from the community have lent a hand to make it a warm and welcoming worship space.

I believe that as Christians we are called to sow seeds of God's Kingdom, and not to focus solely on getting bottoms on seats on a Sunday morning. However, at our first service in the Upper Room we did not have enough seats. I feel that the universal church, not just the Methodist one, needs to rethink what it means by church. In my opinion it can no longer be about

what happens for an hour on a Sunday morning alone, and it is hoped that the 'Upper Room' might go some way towards bringing God into the lives of those that do not yet know him.

As part of Churches together in Axminster we were asked in the summer if we would provide hospitality for the 'Rise Hub'. This is a project, spear headed by the police, to reach out to those affected by drug and alcohol addiction. At the beginning, some eight weeks ago, we were there solely to make tea and coffee, but over the weeks the relationship has changed. We have found ourselves praying with and being there, for users of the group.

We provided Christmas lunch for 30 people, from town councils, to the police, from Rise workers to the clients. We shared a meal, we sang Christmas carols, and everyone received a gift of homemade chocolate and a little booklet explaining the real meaning of Christmas. Francis of Assisi once said, "preach the gospel – use words if you have to". That day, as I stood in the corner and watched as the gospel of God's love was embodied in that room, it felt like Jesus himself was dancing on the table. If that is not worship, or that is not church, I don't know what is.

Since then one of the Rise Hub councillors has welcomed the suggestion that as part of the enrichment programme, we could offer a Bible study, or faith discussion group, maybe even Tuesday church in the 'Upper Room'. Tomorrow we launch 'Little Pips', a parent and toddler group run in partnership with the Children centre. There are also conversations taking place to open a Community café on a Wednesday, in partnership with the 'Project', a charity working with young people with mental health issues. The highly successful and well respected Job Club, which is yet another churches together initiative, has also moved into its new home at Pippin. So, as you can see it is a wonderful opportunity to do church differently, to think outside the box, and meet people where they are. I firmly believe that God is doing a new thing, and he wants us to be a part of it.

Axminster Methodist Church is moving into a new phase of their journey with God, but I am convinced that this is just phase one. I am sure that there are many improvements we can make to the room, and it is hoped that we might be able to use some of the money raised from the sale of the old building to further God's mission in this new place.

Famine In East Africa

Protracted civil conflicts, entrenched economic crises, droughts and unpredictable rainfall have led to widespread food insecurity across East Africa and neighbouring countries such as Yemen. On 20 February 2017 it was announced that South Sudan had reached tipping point and was declared as officially affected by famine.

Wonford Methodist Church has responded quickly and extremely generously to this catastrophic situation by supporting the appeal being managed by 'All We Can'. In just a few short weeks we have raised £622.06 which will be sent to 'All We Can' so they can work with international humanitarian aid partners to respond to the immediate urgent needs in South Sudan and Somalia. Malnutrition is widespread, in some countries water is scarce and the need for lifesaving aid; food, water and sanitation is critical.

Being Christian in the Community of Wonford

I'm sure you will all have noticed our array of Solar panels on our Church Hall roof, and you'll know that they generate electricity when the sun shines on them. Do you know that if we aren't needing any power at the time when it's generated, then the 'spare' power goes into our local community to be used by our neighbours: Lidl's, the Doctor's Surgery or nearby homes? – a benefit for them. Of course we paid to have the Solar panels; and it was money we decided to spend for a number of reasons. Do you know that we "earn" over £1,800 each year from the power we produce? They've been up over 6 years and soon we'll have cleared their original cost.

Have you heard of the ECO church? – a movement which encourages churches to discuss and re-think their impact in "cleaner and greener" ways. At Wonford Methodist Church, over the last 6 years we've begun that journey. We may not have a graveyard around the church to help maintain a "greener" wildlife-friendly place, but our Solar panels are a first step.

Do you have a concern for our Wonford community? Do you seek to serve Christ in Wonford? Do you think "green" energy is a way forward? Do you

want to learn more how we could become an accredited ECO Church? You might like to look at the following link: http://ecochurch.arocha.org.uk/. This might provide a way of getting a group of people to share the concern and root it within an understanding of this being part of our discipleship.
