A Message From The Minister

Dear Friends

As cupbearer, Nehemiah was one of King Artaxerxes' most trusted official. Nehemiah would be responsible for tasting the king's food to ensure it wasn't poisoned, so it was not without risks and, I sincerely hope, well paid! Having heard such distressing news about Jerusalem, Nehemiah boldly asks Artaxerxes for leave to go to Jerusalem and rebuild the ruins. This is a brave thing to do. Your only thought was supposed to be what you can do for the king, not to ask the king to do anything for you. Fortunately, the ground has been prepared with lots of prayer, as we shall see....

Nehemiah is clearly a down to earth and practical man. He likes to get things done. Yet it is significant how, on hearing of the desolate state into which Jerusalem has fallen, doesn't immediately leap into action. Instead, he prays - for five months. Many would be tempted to get stuck in straightaway, but Nehemiah instead chooses to do business with God first. Firstly, of course, he has to bring his grief to God. Hearing of the destruction and desolation his homeland has suffered would have been a massive shock to the system. He needs to lament and bring his pain before God this is vital as unacknowledged pain can lead to a person either lashing out at others or turning in on themselves. Bringing his sense of loss into the presence of God, reassures him that he is not alone and resources him with the strength he needs to proceed onwards. Secondly, Nehemiah is very conscious that he is, before anything else, a servant of God. The task is God's, and the direction and inspiration absolutely must come from Him. When we approach any task as if it all depended on us, shutting God out (though perhaps saying a prayer to begin with as a formality), then we are on a hiding to nothing. Sometimes we have to set aside our assumptions and desires and ideas in order to really seek God's direction. God is not there to bless our plans - we, like Nehemiah, are His servants, not He ours. Once in Jerusalem, Nehemiah inspects the extent of the destruction for himself. Having done that, and been suitably appalled, he says to the assembled officials of Jerusalem, that he has been seeking the direction of God and now is the time to act with the stirring words, "Let us rise up and build". Beginning to go back to church again feels a little like rebuilding from scratch. Our heads are filled with risk assessments, masks, what the latest rules are, and it can seem a little overwhelming, just as the rebuilding of Jerusalem must have seemed overwhelming to Nehemiah. As we travel into an uncertain future, it is more crucial than ever that we put prayer at the heart of everything we do, seeking to embrace the future which God has planned for us, rather than striking out on our own. This might slow us down. We might prefer to get stuck straight in. it is absolutely vital however, that we remember that, like Nehemiah, we are God's servants and it is not until we have prayerfully tuned into God's will that we can say, "Let us rise up and build".



OUR WORLD SLOW TO ACT

A while ago, I watched the film 'Diamonds Are Forever' for the umpteenth time. At one point in the film, James Bond says to a group, "Good morning, gentlemen, we're cleaning up the world, and thought this would be a good point to start." That film was made in 1971, and so 50 years later, we have not made those necessary strides forward to clean up the world.

Way back in the 1960's, a young American singer made a wonderful, challenging vinyl record about the damage done to creation. I nearly wore my copy of the record out. The chorus booms out:

"We're using up the world, can't you see, Saying that it's all for you and me, We're using up the world one more time, And taking away what's yours and mine."

Sixty years on, our world is still slow to act as ecologically as it should. James Bond's fictional enemy, Blofeld, had a plan to blow up Washington DC, but if we do not clean up the world, the consequences are a million-time times more dire. Diamonds are forever, but our world is teetering on the edge of destruction!

Extreme weather conditions worldwide such as floods, fire, volcanic eruptions are wreaking havoc, and thousands of terrified people are forced to flee their homes which are destroyed before their eyes. Closer to home is Happisburg on the Norfolk coast, where acres of land keep collapsing into the sea and people's homes are cruelly swept away. We persist in damaging the world God gave us by chopping down forests, continually burning oil, coal and gas, and thus increasing global temperatures alarmingly, melting ice caps and raising sea levels.

It is time to act NOW, and the world's last BIG chance is in Glasgow at the COP26 Conference. Will the nations who gather make those vital changes? Will we ever be able to sing with confidence again?

Prayer Focus for December

Prayer - Our Strongest Weapon - Pray Without Ceasing

We are now in the season of Advent. Throughout Advent our focus is on the build up to The Christ Child coming to earth as a baby on that first Christmas. We are also reminded that we should be preparing ourselves afresh for the Second Coming of Jesus Christ. During your build up to Christmas, try and take time out to spend time with God, so that you can know His Everlasting Peace and Assurance during this busy season. Here are some thoughts to help you, using the theme for each of the Sundays in Advent.

Week beginning 5th December 2021 – The 2nd Sunday of Advent – The Word of God in The Old Testament. Thank God for the precious gift we have of The Bible, His Holy Word. Give thanks for those who over the years and still today work to make it relevant for today. Give thanks for preachers, Bible teachers, Bible translators, printing processes and new ways of giving people worldwide, access to The Bible in a language they can understand.

Week beginning 12th December 2021 – The 3rd Sunday of Advent – The Forerunner, John The Baptist. Praise and thank God for the prophets of old and John The Baptist, how they prepared the way for The Christ. How they stood steadfast to the message God gave them to give to those who would listen. Pray for all those people today, who point people to Jesus Christ and the joy and riches that can only be found in Him.

Week beginning 19th December 2021 – The 4th Sunday of Advent – The Annunciation – Traditionally, we think about Mary, but we should also think about Joseph and the role he had in raising Jesus. Pray for all parents today, the struggles they face in raising children. Pray for those whose children are sick or terminally ill. Pray for those who will be finding this Christmas difficult because they have lost a child or partner.

Week beginning 26th December 2021 – This Sunday is Boxing Day or The Feast of St. Stephen – the first Christian martyr. Give thanks for all those who have held fast to their faith in Jesus Christ, even when it meant death. Pray for those who are persecuted, imprisoned and die for their faith in Jesus Christ today.

Pray for those whom you know who may be struggling in their marriage.

Week beginning 23rd January 2022 – Today's Gospel reading from Luke, we can read about Jesus reading from the prophet Isaiah in His local Synagogue. Jesus ends the reading by saying, "Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing." Pray for our Methodist Circuit, the various churches within it, the Ministers and Deacon, the various staff, paid and volunteers. Pray that God will give us a vision and goal that He wants for us in the year and years ahead. Ask God to give us guidance on how He wants us to reach these goals.

Week beginning 30th January 2022 – In today's reading from Luke's Gospel, Jesus faces opposition in His home town of Nazareth. Pray for all those who face opposition because of their faith in Jesus. Opposition from family members, their community, their governments. Pray for those who have taken the decision to leave their own country to find safety in another country.
