A Message From The Minister

Dear Friends,

We have learnt an awful lot from the great sweep of history, and one standout lesson is that where God's kingdom grows and His Kingdom advances, there is always opposition. You can, if you look carefully, see broad patterns within this opposition too and, roughly speaking, you can identify three kinds of 'forces' that oppose Christ and His Church.

Firstly, there is persecution. Horrendous in the earliest days of the Church and still raging fiercely today in many parts of the world. The powers that be of this world cannot cope with the full-throttle, no-holds-barred power of God in its midst and tries, unsuccessfully, to stamp on it.

Secondly (and in our part of the world, this will be more in line with our experience), there is untruth. Belief systems that don't originate in God, and very often seem perfectly good and rational in themselves, make us question whether our faith really is all that God says it is. We half consciously, even unconsciously, move away from understanding our faith as something given, revealed, a gift, towards believing it to be something that we construct. Thus is Living Faith replaced with anxious managerialism.

The third form of attack is what's outrageously called 'sin' – settling for being less than what God intended. Being our own version of good rather than being who God is calling us to be.

The churches that Jesus addressed through John in the book of Revelation in Ch 2-3 struggle with all of these as they try to bear witness to the gospel in sometimes nightmarish circumstances. They don't get everything right. Much of what they lived through, we can't even imagine. For the next seven months, this bit of the newsletter will be a short reflection on the message given to each of these churches. It's a ridiculously short space in which to do this – but I hope it will help you to encourage you to reflect on these challenging messages and ponder what they might have to say to us today.

So – the first church – Ephesus (Revelation 2. 1-7) The Ephesians are a hard working, efficient bunch. They've got the 'doing' thing down to a fine art. They have hung on to the integrity of their faith too, in a world with many competing belief systems and pressure to opt for a faith more acceptable to the powers that be. They resist and are commended for it. This is no mean

feat, and there is nothing hollow or glib about Jesus' praise of their integrity. It is truly astonishing, given the circumstances.

In all their activity - their 'doing' however, their 'being' has suffered. The love they first discovered in Christ Jesus, the 'love they were born to know' in John Betjeman's lovely phrase, has blown away like sand in the wind and revealed bare rock beneath. If only they had realised that being and doing are two sides of the Christian coin, that we have nothing of value to give if we are not nurturing our own relationship with Christ and opening ourselves to His love - His love note, not our weak imitation of it, in every part of our lives. Christian faith isn't just about what we do. It's about being changed inside. It's about becoming Christ-like, and that can only happen through the work of the Holy Spirit inside us. Christian faith begins inside us and then works its way outwards. Our doing flows from our being. Doing unnourished by being becomes hard, arid and mechanical. It doesn't delight God. It's the same with doctrine. This much the Ephesians learnt. Yet when good Christian practice and right Christian belief, both issuing from a deep love for God become evident, there is singing and dancing in heaven. We see in Revelation churches settling for just one of these and neglecting the rest and getting a sharp rebuke for it. God is relentless in urging us on to the very best - because He is perfect love and can do no other.

Today, you can still see the ruins of ancient Ephesus. Massive public buildings. Houses. Shops. A Gladiator's graveyard. The Temple of Artemis. Archaeologists eventually found the ruins of a church. There are however, no remains of a church later than the period this letter was written and no actives churches in the area to this day. God did indeed take away their lampstand.


Home Group

UK Pollinator Monitoring Scheme

The Christian "Season of Celebration 2019" took place between September 1st and October 4th. The theme for 2019 was bio-diversity and celebrating it as a part of creation given and sustained by a loving God.

During the autumn the Wonford Book Club read the History of Bees by Maja Lunde. The book portrayed three different generations of beekeeping from the past, the present and into the future.

The past generation focused on the development of the modern bee-hive. The present looked at Colony Collapse Disorder. This real problem sees worker bees abandoning a hive leaving the colony to eventually die. The effect of this decline on agriculture and the economy is immediate and marked. The future generation imagines a world where bees and pollinating insects have completely disappeared. In this imagined world humans must take over the bees' role and children are trained in the painstaking process of pollinating by hand as soon as they go to school.

Without adequate pollinators famine sets in on a vast scale and society itself begins to collapse. The book is a novel but it portrays a disturbing picture of what might happen if we do not care for the natural world around us.

Pollinators include bees, butterflies, hoverflies, beetles, moths and some wasps amongst other insects. Today there is concern about their decline in numbers. The decline has been put down to many factors such as loss of habitats, lack of flowering plants and parasites. Other factors include climate change, modern farming practice and use of pesticides. Over 80% of flowering plants depend on animal pollinators. Plants make up the basic components of all eco-systems and any changes to the health and population of pollinators can all affect plant species and threaten the natural systems and diversity that nature provides.

Private gardens can have a rich diversity of plants and provide much support to bees and a wide number of pollinators. There can be more pollinators in gardens and urban areas than surrounding rural farmland. We can help support pollinators in any garden by introducing more nectar and pollen rich plants, allowing some lawn weeds to reach flowering, providing some water in a shallow vessel, avoiding using pesticides especially around open flowers and providing undisturbed areas where bees may nest, such as in bare soil and under wood. Caring for the smallest of insects can have a big effect on the environment and demonstrates the unique value that creation places on all creatures and species.

Giving Graciously

I have been the Treasurer of Wonford Methodist Church for over 10 years and I have been amazed at the generosity of everyone. We are a truly blessed fellowship.

We are part of the body of Christ and as such we should take our responsibilities seriously by displaying God's love and grace to those we meet. A healthy church is built on firm spiritual foundations and equally firm financial foundations as well.

Financing the Church

It costs about £783 per week to run Wonford Methodist Church and is made up as shown below.

Our offerings amount to £652 so you can see there is a bit of a gap. Part of that gap is made up by the money we get from our PV cells, the money we receive from our Trustees and lettings, however there is still a gap.

Over the past couple of years our expenditure has exceeded our income so we are running a deficit budget. Ideally, we should be able to balance our books and any additional income (over our expenditure) can be used to fund major projects.

Our Church is supported by the generosity of our fellowship and through

that generosity we support lots of other charities. During the last financial year we supported over 20 different charities both financially and by donating gifts.

In addition have a magnificent set of buildings, a varied and dynamic team of worship leaders, and a large number of thriving activities which provide Christian outreach and witness in our community and encourage and strengthen our own fellowship in their faith.

In simple terms to balance our books we need to increase our income.

We have about 83 church members; some are young people not earning, some are retired and on a fixed income and some are not working. In addition our congregation changes with people joining the church and people moving on.

Some people are giving as much as they can and God bless you for that! Some review their giving on a regular basis and increase their giving if they are able and that's wonderful too.

Here are three ideas to think about:

When did you last review how much you give? Many people increase their offering on a regular basis.

The envelope scheme or contributing your offering by standing order encourages regular giving. Gift Aid boosts our income by thousands of pounds a year so if you pay income tax make sure you let us know.

Please remember, the cost of running the church is the same whether you attend or not.

Think prayerfully about whether you could manage to give a little more.

It is always difficult to ask people to give more to church funds, but we feel that a small increase in contribution from each of our fellowship would result in us being able to balance our books and a big improvement in our ability to finance major projects.
