A Message From The Minister


Dear Friends,

Psalm 32

'Be perfect as your Heavenly Father is perfect' said Jesus. Gulp! Trying to be a better person is one thing, but being so perfect that you're just like God is impossible is it not? Well yes, it is. That's the point. We can't raise ourselves up to that level purely by our own efforts but when the Lord looks at all those who have accepted Him and His saving work, He sees us, not as we are in our natural selves, but as the redeemed and holy people He is helping us to become. So there's no need to be anxious! If you still need convincing though, look at Psalm 32. It's a great hymn of praise from someone who has been the recipient of so much grace and mercy from the Lord that he can't help but sing about it.

Not that God is just standing by, waiting for us to fall so he can pick us back up again. No, He is constantly acting in our lives to guide, protect and strengthen us. The Psalms are not just a collection of pious statements with no basis in reality - the raw honesty in many of the Psalms attests to that. They are expressions of lives experience, of the writers very real relationship with God and they also help us today as we seek walk with God in our day to day lives. Above all, they encourage us to cultivate genuine thankfulness, even in difficult times, for God's constant presence and never-failing mercy. Hence the closing words of this Psalm: "Be glad in the Lord, celebrate you faithful!".


The Away Group

Trees of the Bible

Biblical trees hold significant meaning, symbolism, and beauty. Trees in Christian spirituality represent more than growth and specific parables; they act as a reminder to Christians of God's creation, love, and kindness. God is the omnipotent creator of all things — trees included. He provided trees for humans to sustain themselves with the fruits, seeds, shelter, fire and beauty.

Over 36 types of trees are named in the bible. Many of them were quite significant.

King Solomon imported Cedars from Lebanon to build a temple (1 Kings 5 v 6-10)

- Deborah sat under the Palm of Deborah to judge(Judges 4 v 4)
- Elijah sat down under a Broom Tree and was touched by an angel (1 Kings 19 v 4-5)
- Zacchaeus climbed a Sycamore Tree so he could see Jesus (Luke 19 v 4)
- · King Saul had his headquarters under a Pomegranate Tree in Migron
- (1 Samuel 14 v 2)
- The Lord cursed a Fig Tree which made it shrivel (Matthew 21:19-22)
- Noah used Gopher wood to make the Ark (Genesis 6 v 14)
- Jacob peeled tree shoots from Poplar, Almond and Fig trees to place in front of Laban's sheep so they would be speckled, streaked or spotted and would therefore become Jacobs (Genesis 30 v37-43)

Throughout the Bible, trees symbolise different themes and meanings.

Olive Tree

Olive trees curry favour throughout the Bible and remain a long-standing symbol of peace, harmony, prosperity, and covenants between two parties. In the Old Testament, a dove brings Noah an olive branch after the Great Flood to signify the earth was ready to grow new life again. As a plant, the olive tree takes patience to grow and thrive — an allegory for our relationship with God. Don't forget, even Jesus prayed under a garden of olive trees to talk to God the night before he was crucified.

Cedar Tree

Cedarwood possesses a pleasant aroma and remains pretty resistant to bugs or decay. The Bible specifically calls out the "Cedars of Lebanon" as stately, slow-growing, and steadfast trees to which good Christians should compare themselves. The Cedars of Lebanon, however, are a sobering reminder to believers that every good and pure thing comes from God — and if taken for granted, judgment will come.

Oak Tree

Have you ever been called an "oak of righteousness?" Throughout the Old and New Testaments, oak trees symbolise stability and strength, like when describing King Solomon's rule or the righteousness of Job.

Grapevine

The grapevine, or just a vine, carried the significance of Israel's relationship with God. Not only Israel, but all believers in God. Jesus makes the metaphor in the New Testament that he himself is the vine, and the only way to Heaven is through belief in him, specifically saying, "I am the true

grapevine, and my Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch of mine that doesn't produce fruit, and he prunes the branches that do bear fruit so they will produce even more."

Palm Tree

Palms and palm trees are closely associated with Jesus' exuberant entrance into Jerusalem. They also carry another significance: the fronds used in Christian Palm Sunday celebrations are burned to create the ash for Ash Wednesday.

Sycamore Tree

In the New Testament, Zacchaeus climbed a sycamore tree to see Jesus preach amid a large crowd of people. At the time, it was considered embarrassing for a grown man to climb a tree — but Zacchaeus abandoned his pride in the hopes of seeing Jesus..

Fig Tree

Fig trees have deep meanings in the Bible and range from symbolizing Israel itself to security or inner peace. Again and again, figs find mention in the Old and New Testaments as symbols of safety, bountiful families, and decadence. Furthermore, a fig tree is one of the only types of trees explicitly mentioned in the Garden of Eden.

Acacia Tree

Did you know that acacia wood is one of the only hardwood trees growing in the Middle East and Israel? As a strong wood built for construction, it's no wonder the Bible mentions acacia wood and trees in the same context as the Ark of the Covenant and Tabernacles. Acacia wood was used to build the holy Tabernacle of Moses and was so strong, it was allegedly in use for 400 years after its creation.

Dogwood Tree

Scholars and Biblical students believe the cross on which Jesus was crucified was built from dogwood. As such, it is said that God both blessed and cursed the dogwood tree. The "Legend of the Dogwood Tree" persists both in and out of Christian theology, mystifying other religious followers, gardeners, and more.

Pomegranate Tree

Rich in seeds, colour, and flavour, the pomegranate tree specifically illustrates themes of prosperity and wealth in the Old Testament books

Numbers and Deuteronomy. Tangentially related to Christian theology, some Jewish Traditions think that pomegranates were chosen to colour the robes of priests and as temple decorations because they have 613 seeds — just as the Torah has 613 laws to follow.

How Will 2024 End?

The acclaimed film 'The Third Man' ends with Anna walking along a cemetery path towards the exit gate, where an American writer, Martins, (played by Joseph Cotton) is waiting for her. He expects Anna to come to him, so they can develop their new-found relationship, but at the last minute, Carol Reed the brilliant Director changes the script, and directs Anna to keep walking past Cotton and out into the street alone. Even Cotton was surprised at the ending!

Virginia Laparra was an anti-corruption lawyer in Guatemala, who successfully broke up several criminal networks, arresting dozens of politicians who had previously been considered untouchable. Sadly over a year ago, Virginia herself was arrested and is in a tiny prison cell 23 hours a day. Amnesty International is striving with all its might for her release and bring an end to her nightmare, and a restoration of justice. Where will it end?

The Leprosy Mission too keeps on trying to end this cursed disease. Every two minutes someone is diagnosed with leprosy! When one sufferer uncovered her blistered hands she said, "Now I can't feel anything on my hands. I burn myself whenever I cook." It's an uphill climb, but leprosy is a curable disease. What will the coming 12 months achieve?

Likewise, how much easier will it be in 2024 for many more people to pay their rent or mortgage, and not struggle to afford climbing food prices? Will fewer householders experience 'no-fault' evictions? And where will the Church be at the close of 2024? Will we have caught a fresh vision for sharing the love of Christ with more people, or will many more Churches have to close?

Can there possibly be a good ending to the wasteland hell in Gaza, where millions are cowering without food or shelter in a bombed graveyard? Will Israelis come to realise that the Palestinian people deserve to be an independent State, and abolish their evil apartheid? What will that ending be?

St Paul, banished to prison yet again, must have wondered what the future held for the young Christian Church, but then he fervently wrote, "I know in whom I have believed, and I am convinced that He is able to guard what He has entrusted to me." Centuries before, when the Jews had seen their Temple systematically destroyed, Zechariah encouraged the downcast Jews with God's words, "If you live the way I tell you, and remain obedient in my service, everyone will get along with one another, with friendly visits on one another's porches."

LOVE, not hate is still our supreme weapon for life's journey. May God's love flood the world in 2024! Blessed New Year!

Pray for all the nations which are experiencing conflict. Be encouraged that God is in control.


