A Message From The Minister

Dear Friends,

After a break for a couple of months, I'm returning to reflect on the rhythms of discipleship we're being encouraged to explore this year (though we could easily also make a case for rest being an essential rhythm of discipleship!). Having previously considered "giving thanks", "keeping silence" and "pray", we move this time to look at "Act".

After Easter, we spent the week at Spring Harvest. The theme this year was "Only the Brave: Determined Discipleship", based on the teaching of the book of James. James famously, and for some controversially, argued that 'faith without works is dead' (James 2: 17 & 26). James was not trying to suggest that we achieve salvation through the things we do (works), or that we don't need to place our trust (faith) in the love and grace shown to us by God in Jesus. Rather, James' point was more along the lines of the proverb which says that "the proof of the pudding is in the eating". An apple pie might look great, it might smell wonderful, but if when you eat it it tastes of pears, it's not really an apple pie. So too with faith; it's not simply a question of saying or believing 'the right thing', if faith is real it will characterise who we are, running through each part of us and lives, not just looking right from the outside. At Spring Harvest it was suggested that this teaching of James could be summed up by "Live It!"

When we look at the description of the early church from which we get these rhythms of discipleship (Acts 2: 42-47) we can clearly see these were a people who tried to Live It! The faith that they had in the risen Jesus had a profound impact on how they lived. They were willing to share and to give. They shaped their lives around doing those things that would help build and sustain their faith (in the temple, teaching, eating together), but they didn't just look in on themselves – they distributed money to all, as they had need. It's not surprising that we are told they had the goodwill of all people!

So how do you Live It? James passionately argues that it is as we see our faith put into action that we demonstrate it is real, is alive. In what ways do you put your faith into action? Part of the rhythm of our discipleship is to use opportunities to live out the things we say we believe (whether in everyday ways around the house, or in intentional acts of service within the church or community).

For faith to be alive, we must Live It!

This group meets in the lounge at 2pm normally on the third Thursday each month. All are welcome. continuing to study Job.



5th July – Trusting through Anger and Disappointment




Book Review

Thank you for Andrew Simpson (a new contributor to Contact) for this book review.

'Anna and Mister God' by 'Fynn'

At first sight this appears to be a children's' book, but it is anything but that. Although it was first published in 1964, the events it describes actually occurred during the mid-1930s, indicating the amount of time the author, Sydney George Hopkins, had to reflect upon the events it portrays and the implications towards his own life.

Some time in the mid-1930s Hopkins, a tall, well built, but clever character, was wandering late in the evening around the back streets of south London. He was interested in analytical chemistry and philosophy,



and spent much of his time wandering around trying to unravel in his mind the complexities of these subjects. He states in the text that he was 19 at the time, but the timeline related back to his birth-date suggests that he was actually younger, probably nearer 16.

As he wandered down a fog-bestrewn alley he suddenly came upon a little girl, sitting on a grating beneath a bakery shop window. The encounter was quite peculiar. He recalled:

'Looking back over thirty years I can now cope with those three hours, but at the time I was on the verge of being destroyed. That November night was pure hell; my guts tied themselves into all manner of complicated knots. 'Perhaps even then something of her angelic nature caught hold of me. I am quite prepared to believe that I had been bewitched from the beginning.'

There seems to be some question over whether the events Hopkins describes ever happened at all, whether the little girl Anna actually existed, or whether Hopkins was using the character of a little child to illustrate his own thoughts about life and religion. But the introducer to the first edition, theologian Vernon Sproxton (Rowan Williams wrote a subsequent Introduction), actually met Hopkins having read his initial draughts before publication, and seen some of his documents and keep-sakes about the little girl, and concluded that the story was true, although Hopkins may have embellished parts of it.

And so we have Anna, the 'astonishing child'. Her innocent but questioning view of the world gave her an insight into some theological and other issues that have confounded adults throughout the ages. Even the opening passage of the book has a charm about it that would touch most hearts:

"The differense (sic) from a person and an angel is easy. Most of an angel is in the inside, and most of a person is on the outside.' These are the words of six year of Anna ... At five years Anna knew absolutely the purpose of being, knew the meaning of love and was a personal friend and helper of Mister God. At six Anna was a theologian, mathematician, philosopher, poet and gardener. If you asked her a question you would always get an answer – in due course.'

The ultimate tragedy of Anna's life is that she never made it to her eighth birthday. She fell off a fence and subsequently died. In Chapter 7 Hopkins gives two remarkable illustrations of how she communicated to him her love of 'Mister God.' The Kingdom of God was like a radio repair (she had seen Hopkins repairing a radio): one could either work on it from the 'outside in' or from the 'inside out'. Thus people who thought they were Christians were on the outside, seeing all the teaching and commandments, but not practising them; whereas those inside the Kingdom were practising their teaching and commandments, as well as believing them. This applied to Sikhs and Muslims as well as Christians.

Theirs was a shared relationship: Hopkins took Anna to a dressing table and placed a black line between the two wing mirrors, moving each window towards the other so that the black line appeared to move correspondingly, seeming to prove that things in the world were not always as they seemed., just as the rules of mathematics could be beaten by reflected images: 2 appeared as 5 in reflection. So 2 plus five could equal 7 or 4, or even 10. All this to Anna seemed to confirm the mysteries of 'Mr. God', a concept that both she and 'Fynn' realised simultaneously.

Mr. God, this is Anna is available in an omnibus edition entitled Anna and Mr. God, with the later works Anna's Book and Anna and the Black Knight and published by Harper Collins in 1978, or each title is available separately.

News From The Methodist Church

"Reforms are urgent, now is the time for tough action": Dame Margaret Hodge

Christian leaders united in the House of Lords on Tuesday 17 April to challenge government inactivity on tax justice reforms and to demand immediate tough action. Launching "Church Action for Tax Justice" (CAT), President-Designate of the Methodist Conference, the Revd Michaela A Youngson, joined Lords Rowan Williams and Richard Harries, Dame Margaret Hodge and Quaker Leader Paul Parker to demand an end to corporate tax evasion, greater transparency and a change to the negative narrative around tax.

In her speech to a packed committee room, the Revd Youngson said: "I hope we can shift the narrative around tax away from it being a dirty word, or a necessary evil, but rather a blessing and a means of all citizens having a stake in a generous society that cares for all." Dr Rowan Williams talked about an "unquenchable thirst for more" in the corporate sector (referencing the name of the Christian Aid report), a "wilful blindness" amongst policy makers and how tax should not be "an us and them but a recognition of shared goals and mutuality".

Opening the meeting, Dame Margaret Hodge, Chair of the All-Party Parliamentary Group on Responsible Tax, congratulated the new initiative, saying: "there has never been a more important time than today to address issues of tax justice...this is not anti-business but pro fairness...Reforms are urgent, now is the time for tough action."

CAT will seek to inspire all Churches about the urgency of creating fairer and more effective tax systems to fund healthier public services, both in the UK and internationally.

Dr Rowan Williams, the Chair of the Christian Aid Board, said: "The creation of this new Church-wide movement is timely. Many of the world's largest companies seem to have forgotten that they have moral duties, as well as legal ones. They must support human flourishing, not least by paying their fair share of taxes in all the countries where they do business - and being fully transparent about the relevant data."

Ending financial secrecy in UK tax havens like the British Virgin Islands is

one of the reforms CAT will pursue, along with changes to the way large multinational companies are taxed.

In addition, the new campaign will call on Churches themselves to make more vigorous and vocal use of their power as investors in major companies.

CAT has developed out of the Methodist Tax Justice Network and seeks to be more ecumenical, embracing all Church denominations.

One recent sign of the success of the worldwide movement for tax justice has been the decision by Vodafone to publish its country-by-country reports from 2019 onwards. Christian Aid, the Tax Justice Network and others have long campaigned for major multinationals to publish such data, because it can throw up suspicious patterns that alert tax authorities and civil society to potential tax dodging. This, in turn, helps them to hold companies to account.

The President and Vice-President's Easter message

In their Easter message, the President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference focus on the Resurrection.

The Revd Loraine N Mellor reflects on the song "I can only imagine", which reminds her of the first Easter morning when the women went to the tomb and discovered what had happened.

She says: "No resurrection erases the tragedy of the Cross. Nothing erases the violence and the horror of Good Friday ... But, it is now time to rejoice and to smile and for our faces to display hope, for the tragedy of the Cross could not shut holy love out of the world."

Lorraine invites to consider what our reaction will be to the Resurrection when we wake up on Easter morning.

Living in Glasgow, the Vice-President Jill Baker has spent a lot of the year travelling. She uses that image to think about Jesus' journey to the cross and beyond, along with the journey of his disciples and friends, including the women who accompanied him.

She asks: "What are you waiting for at this point in your journey of life or of faith? What are we waiting for, or hoping for in our congregations, circuits, districts, in the Connexion? "

And then offers the response: "After ... waiting and watching, we will be ready for the sun to rise in splendour, ready for a dawn of unimaginable glory to break."
