A Message From The Minister

Dear Friends,

Revelation 2. 18-29

T.S.Eliot wrote of how, throughout our lives, we proceed from 'wrong to wrong' without seeming to be able to do anything about it, unless 'restored by that refining fire', by which he meant the Holy Spirit. The Spirit, says Eliot, has the power to work in our lives as a purifying fire, burning away impurities, and leaving behind something purer, the essential 'us' that God always wanted us to be. I wonder if that idea might help us to understand why Jesus introduces Himself to the church in Thyatira as one whose 'eyes are like flaming fire'. The Thyatirans need to know that Jesus brings uncomfortable, but ultimately liberating and cleansing power into their lives. His eyes, as they flame like fire, search hearts and minds, and nothing can escape His gaze.

Christian faith, holding on to Jesus, will take us far nearer to the heart of life than anything else can possibly do. It is so vital not to settle for a diluted, compromised belief, not because Jesus is some stern, disapproving policeman figure, but because we can so easily think we're following Jesus whilst pursuing a path that ultimately leads us away from Him. God will never cease to desire our full and uninhibited flourishing and stand resolutely opposed to anything which prevents it. Hence Christ's harsh words about this 'Jezebel' figure, whose siren song has encouraged some of the Thyatiran Christians to mix pagan practices with their Christian devotion. Using the name Jezebel of course, is a reminder of the wife of King Ahab who we can read about in 1 Kings 16-22. Jezebel, an avowed enemy of God's people, came to a very sticky end and her name would become a byword for temptation and treachery. Whatever seductive promises might have been made to the Thyatirans, they will lead, in the end, to a dark and bleak place. The road to true life might seem narrower, but it leads to a future more glorious than anything we can presently imagine. For those who seek this better future and spurn Jezebel's promises (let Jezebel for us stand for any belief, lifestyle, habit, whatever, that would weaken or blur our relationship with Christ), Jesus offers the 'morning star'. In Revelation 22.16, the morning star represents Jesus Himself, so He is offering nothing less than to share His very self with His people – with us. Just think of that.

The theme for this year's World Environment Day is 'celebrating biodiversity'. This day has been celebrated internationally since 1974 and its purpose is to help us focus on action we can take to combat the world's environmental problems.

Biodiversity is defined as the variety and variability of life on Earth. There are estimated to be 8.7 million species on Earth with approximately 1.3 million identified so far. We are blessed with an abundance of life on this planet but these organisms are at huge risk. We are on the verge of the next big mass extinction. Within the next ten years it is estimated that 1 million species will become extinct. Wildlife has reduced by over 60% during the last fifty years. Humans and livestock animals now account for 96% of mammal biomass on this planet. 70% of all birds are farmed poultry. Nature has been pushed to the brink. Complex systems have developed over millions of years and these are in jeopardy. Our fate is intricately linked with other life. As stewards of this world, the fate of wildlife is in our hands.

What can we do to help protect biodiversity? We could purchase household products that are eco-friendly. Recycling lowers the use of petroleum needed in manufacture and reduces the impact on forest ecosystems from making paper products. However recycling still requires energy and therefore reducing waste and reusing items is paramount. Purchasing eco-friendly appliances and using energy saving light bulbs will reduce emissions. Switching to a green energy supplier would help us move towards more sustainable energy sources. Planting more bee friendly flowers and using natural pest control protects our precious pollinators. We

might consider walking more and driving less to reduce pollution. We are all becoming more environmentally conscious and are looking at ways we can do more. It is important to share our ideas and explore ways that we can be more environmentally friendly. The good news is that there are so many things that we can do. If we all do our bit, we can make a difference.
