

A Message From The Minister

Dear Friends,

We are all very aware of the challenges the church is facing at the moment and, on the whole I believe the church is meeting them brilliantly. Online services, pastoral care via phone calls, food banks, and now many churches are opening up as much as is possible in very limiting circumstances. We have done what we can in our bizarre new situation, and God is blessing our efforts. It also occurs to me that the Church is just as crucial now as it ever was – perhaps more so. People need a reminder that there is more to life than the endless unsettling news cycle, that God is in control, that there is goodness and grace at the heart of existence. If the Church doesn't proclaim this truth, then who will? If the gospel is what the Bible says it is, then it is just as true now as it ever was, and a society which has been shaken, disoriented and left with many questions about the future will most likely be more receptive to spiritual truths than before. Pray, therefore, that people find hope, real hope, in Jesus Christ, amid all their insecurities and fears. Pray that they find new life and hope in the only place it can truly be found.

Remember too, that, as Paul writes, "Our struggle is not against flesh and blood... but against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places" (Ephesians 6.12). This is not the kind of language we usually use today, or feel comfortable with, but that is no reason to dismiss it. I am not at all an expert in what is called 'spiritual warfare', but I am certain that it is required of all of us that we pray for the church and its mission to be protected with Paul's words in mind. That kind of prayer work is vital, and all Christians can take part in it, whether or not they consider themselves to be knowledgeable about 'that kind of thing' - just keep at the back of your mind the words of Jesus: "In this world you will have trouble. But take heart, I have overcome the world" (John 16.33). When we think of the work of the church, we tend to think of the visible, tangible tasks which need to be done; services being led, buildings being maintained, paper work being completed and the like. That's necessary but not the whole story. All that is what goes on 'in the front of the shop'. Real, deep, spiritual work needs to happen 'in the stock room' as it were, covering everything in prayer, attending to the nurture and discipleship of God's people and looking to mission and taking the lifechanging message of the gospel outwards. This is as necessary as ever as we navigate these times with care, but with hope, faith and prayer always undergirding everything we do.

Earth Overshoot Day



'Thinking green' and understanding the breadth and range of the human impact on the Earth's ecosystems are two quite different things. Most people agree that the demands on the planet of 7.8 billion people has altered land use contributing to climate change and pollution. We may also agree that we are consuming more and more natural resources but is it possible to measure how much is being consumed and is it sustainable.

One such measure is known as Earth Overshoot Day and this marks the day in the year when our human demand for resource exceeds what the planet can regenerate over the entire year.

Using this measure we began using more resources than we can replace in the early seventies. In 1972 by mid-December we had used up all that year's resources. The Overshoot Day has steadily got earlier and earlier in the year to the point where last year we had used up 2019's entire production by July 29th.

As we all know 2020 is not a typical year!

As a result of lockdowns across the world the Overshoot Day for 2020 has been calculated at August 22nd a positive move of over 3 weeks later than 2019. This is mainly due to reduced carbon emissions (15% down), reduced food demand and reduced forest destruction (9% down).

Earth Overshoot Day is not a precise measure and does not encompass every aspect of sustainability. It calculates an Ecological Footprint (not just a Carbon Footprint) and adds up the human competitive demand for productive areas. It is not fully comprehensive and can be criticised such as with the use of farmed land. Crops automatically fulfil their own sustainability without regard to the use or waste of the product and oil usage does not include the factor that it is a finite resource that will, at some time, run out.

What it does do is provide a measure that can raise awareness of sustainability. Pandemic 2020 has moved Overshoot Day by 3 weeks, which is back to levels of consumption seen in 2005. It has shown that real advances are possible and targets not just abstract ideals. How much more could be achieved by the coming together of nations and business to move that date back even further.

Let us all come together in prayer to look after the wonder that is God's creation.

Blythswood Care Shoebox Appeal 2020

This year more than ever, we are aware of the importance of caring about others and showing kindness through giving to someone in need. They may feel that because of the global pandemic they may be side-lined or forgotten but imagine the joy when they receive a



colourful paper wrapped box and then discover the gifts inside - what a Christmas present for someone truly in need!

We are collecting boxes through Blythswood Care again this year, though we will need to manage things differently with social distancing and other restrictions. Blythswood is an established Christian charity based in Glasgow, Scotland. They bring hope to families in Europe, Africa and Asia through filled shoeboxes at Christmas, relief and development aid or social projects for young and old. Their motto is 'transforming lives through Christian care for body and soul'.

You need to cover a shoebox in wrapping paper with the lid wrapped separately and they can be for adults as well as teenagers and children. The categories are; Elderly Woman, Man, Woman, Teenage Boy, Teenage Girl, Boy or Girl.

Their website <u>www.blythswood.org</u> will provide a full checklist of items that can be put in the shoeboxes and you can print of a label from there, but if you don't have access to a printer then I can give you a leaflet. The donation towards cost of transporting each shoebox is £3. **Date for final collection at Wonford Methodist is Sunday 15th November.**

Most important items - toothbrush & toothpaste, soap & flannel, hat/scarf/gloves, sweets (dated at least March 2020), a small toy and pencils/pens/paper. Other suggested items for children - a ball, skipping rope, hair

accessories, puzzles, stickers. For adults - shampoo, deodorant, comb, sewing equipment, candles (but no matches), kitchen utensils, screwdriver/pliers, pack of cards, small wind up torch and for teenage girls/woman-sanitary products.

You might like to add in a Christmas card with a message, your name & town/country but do not put in your address. If you have any questions or you want to donate a few items or money instead of filling a box then please let me know - all contributions are very welcome and will help to put a smile on the faces of people who live in such poverty. This shoebox may be the only gift they have ever been given.
